My Dear Friends:

In the Gospel for the Sixth Sunday of Easter we are met with an extraordinary challenge: Jesus commands us to “love one another as I love you” (John 15:12). The letter from John echoes this command. Of course, we are to love those in our family, those we work with, those we like. But the scriptures make clear that we are also to love those we never notice, those we purposely avoid, and even those we are tempted to despise. In this Sunday’s selection from the Acts of the Apostles Peter shows us how far God’s love extends, and how far our love should extend in response. Peter realizes that God no longer “shows partiality” to the Jews, sharing divine love exclusively with them. Christ has revealed that God’s love extends to all people, and so should ours.

NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE OF RALEIGH

YOUNG ADULTS AGES 18 – 18 INVITED TO THE WORLD YOUTH DAY IN PANAMA: The Office of the Secretariat for Lay Formation, Marriage and Family Life of the Diocese of Raleigh invites young adults to join in the common celebration of World Youth Day (WYD) 2019 in Panama.

We would like, as one diocesan family, to live and celebrate the universal Church!

Our pilgrim group will be in Panama from January 21-28, 2019, and our invitation extends to adults ages 18-35. The trip includes round-trip airfare from Raleigh to Panama, lodging at a 4-star hotel within walking distance of the WYD main events, covers the cost of WYD fees, lunches and dinners, and a bonus day trip to the Panama Canal to discover the Miraflores Locks, the Biodiversity Museum and explore the ruins of Panama Viejo.

The total cost per pilgrim is \$2,750, which can be paid through a payment plan.

LAUDATO SI': ON THE CARE OF OUR COMMON HOME (Pope Francis)

IV. THE PRINCIPLE OF THE COMMON GOOD

156. An integral ecology is inseparable from the notion of the common good, a central and unifying principle of social ethics. The common good is "the sum of those conditions of social life which allow social groups and their individual members relatively thorough and ready access to their own fulfilment".[122]

157. Underlying the principle of the common good is respect for the human person as such, endowed with basic and inalienable rights ordered to his or her integral development. It has also to do with the overall welfare of society and the development of a variety of intermediate groups, applying the principle of subsidiarity. Outstanding among those groups is the family, as the basic cell of society. Finally, the common good calls for social peace, the stability and security provided by a certain order which cannot be achieved without particular concern for distributive justice; whenever this is violated, violence always ensues. Society as a whole, and the state in particular, are obliged to defend and promote the common good.
